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The American Freshman: National Norms for Fall 1971

This report presents national normative data on characteristics of students entering colleges as first-time freshmen during the early part of the 1971-72 academic year. It is the sixth in a series of annual reports initiated in 1966 as part of the Cooperative Institutional Research Program (CIRP) conducted by the Office of Research of the American Council on Education. The major purpose of this ongoing longitudinal research program is to determine how students are affected by the colleges they attend (Astin et al., 1966). During the past five years, this steadily expanding program has produced much useful information derived from normative, substantive, and methodological research bearing on a wide range of issues in higher education (Creager and Boruch, 1971; American Council on Education, 1971).

Each year, the first step in implementing this longitudinal program consists of a sample survey of freshmen entering the nation's institutions of higher education. These data are then weighted to provide a normative picture of the college freshman population addressed to persons engaged in guidance, counseling, administration, educational research, and manpower planning, and to the general community of students and parents. The survey instrument, the Student Information Form (SIF), is revised

annually to reflect the changing concerns of the academic community and of other users of the resulting information. 1

In previous surveys of entering freshmen, approximately 15 percent of the nation's institutions of higher education were selected by sampling procedures and invited to participate in the program. As the value of being in the program became better known throughout the academic community, many other institutions requested that they be given an opportunity to participate. accommodate such requests, and to help defray the ever increasing costs of these surveys, the Office of Research decided to invite all institutions that have entering freshman classes and that respond to the U.S. Office of Education's Higher Education General Institution Surveys to participate on a nominal paying basis. A minimum charge, plus a unit rate based on the number of Student Information Forms processed, was assessed. of the relatively late decision to invite these additional institutions, the extent of participation has been substantial, more than compensating for the extra effort involved in expanding the survey operations.

Following the design of previous reports in this series, data are reported separately for men and women, for several

¹The data from the Student Information Form also provide initial input information for longitudinal research. Followup surveys of individual students in each cohort year are conducted at various points in time after the initial survey. Results from a one-year followup of 1966 entering freshmen have been published (Bayer et al., 1970). In addition, as an informational service, followup reports on their students have periodically been sent to institutions that participated in earlier years of the CIRP.

types of institutions, and for different regions of the country; in all there are 24 separate norms groups. Although a total of 288,526 entering freshman students at 487 colleges and universities returned data in time to be processed for inclusion in the 1971 survey, the normative data presented in this report are based on 171,509 freshmen entering 326 institutions. The reason for this difference is that certain quality controls and other technical restrictions were imposed on the total sample of participants to derive the normative sample. Specifically, a participating institution was excluded from the normative sample if it failed to carry out either a complete or a representative sampling of its entering freshman class or if it administered the SIF after the first few weeks of classes. The rationale for this exclusion was discussed in a special report on sampling and weighting procedures (Creager, 1968).

The normative data presented in this report were collected by administering the 1971 Student Information Form to freshmen during registration, freshman orientation, or during the first few weeks of classes. The SIF is designed to elicit a wide range of biographic and demographic data, as well as data on the student's high school background, career plans, educational aspirations, financial arrangements, high school activities and behaviors, and current attitudes. Those data meeting the quality requirements have been differentially weighted to

represent the population of entering freshman students at all higher educational institutions in the United States.²

The Statistical Universe of Institutions

The design of the 1971 survey of entering freshmen incorporates some major modifications of the stratification procedure used in previous surveys. The original design, used in the 1966 and 1967 surveys, was modified in 1968 for use in the third, fourth, and fifth surveys in this series. The same general logic and strategy for sampling and weighting procedures to ensure representativeness of the survey data was used in the two former designs and in the present one. The cell structure, as well as the sampling of institutions within cells and of students within institutions, constitutes a complex, mixed-strategy involving the compromise of several technical and logistical considerations. The three different designs vary primarily in the definitions of the cells, i.e., in the finer control parameters within the major sections (university, four-year, two-year and predominantly black) of the design.

The major reasons for introducing the changes are: (1) availability of more complete and more appropriate information about


²A distinction should be made between higher education and postsecondary education. Thus, these surveys do not include students in proprietary, special vocational, or semiprofessional institutions; they do, however, include those attending two-year colleges with terminal occupational programs.

institutions, (2) changes in the institutional structure in higher education, especially differential growth rates by types of institutions, and (3) accumulated experience regarding the participation rates for various kinds of institutions. Moreover, experience indicates that for normative purposes, the compromise between ideal stratification for substantive research purposes and normative purposes should give greater weight to the latter than has been previously employed. In the two-year colleges, where rapid growth has occurred and selectivity and/or affluence data are either unavailable or less relevant, the basis of stratification adopted in the new design is size and mode of control. Minor restratification of the universities introduces mode of control as one of the parameters of this part of the survey design. The new design is shown in Figure A.

As in the previous surveys, the defined population consists of all eligible institutions of higher education listed by the United States Office of Education in its annual Education Directory (USOE, 1970). An institution was considered eligible if it was functioning at the time of the survey and if it had a freshman class of at least 30 students. Thus, institutions requiring undergraduate credits for admission to their first class (for example, some professional schools) and a few very small institutions were excluded. With these exceptions, the defined population comprised all accredited and nonaccredited institutions listed by the Office of Education, whether university, four-year college, or two-year college; at the time of the 1971 survey, these numbered 2,543.

Of the 2,543 institutions in the population defined for the survey, 2,432 were invited to participate in the 1971 expanded survey of entering freshmen. These included all institutions participating in previous surveys, plus other institutions listed by the Federation of Regional Accrediting Commissions of Higher Education (1970) as accredited, candidates for accreditation, or correspondents of the accrediting commissions. Of the 2,432 invitees, 562 (23.1 percent) participated in one or more of the earlier surveys, and 1,871 (76.9 percent) were new invitees. A total of 531 (21.8 percent) institutions accepted the invitation to participate. Of the 425 that participated in the 1970 survey, 381 (89.6 percent) accepted again in 1971.

Because of administrative and logistic problems, 44 of the institutions that accepted the invitation to participate were unable to return the completed forms in time for inclusion in the national norms. Thus data were obtained from 487 (91.7 percent) of the institutions that had agreed to participate in the 1971 survey. Appendix A lists all institutions that have participated in the Cooperative Institutional Research Program in any of the six years since its inception and indicates for each institution the current stratification cell assignment, the number of years it has taken part in the CIRP, and its status in the 1971 survey.

As was the case with previous surveys, the national norms for entering freshmen are based only on data from those institutions that are judged to have obtained a reasonably representative

sample of their entering freshmen classes. This judgment is based on the percentage of students in the entering freshman class who completed the 1971 Student Information Form and on information about the manner in which the forms were administered. It was decided to base the 1971 national norms on data provided by 326 of the institutions; this figure includes 254 prior participants and 72 new participants.4

Weighting Procedures

Because of disproportionate sampling and participation in the 36 stratification cells, the data obtained from students enrolling at institutions assigned to various cells were differentially weighted. Moreover, the data were adjusted separately by sex to correct for less than 100 percent participation of students within individual colleges. Special care was taken to exclude from the normative sample those students who had transferred into the freshman class from other collegiate institutions.

Table 1 gives information about the institutions included in the 1971 national norms. It shows the number of colleges in each stratification cell and the cell weights applied to each institution's data in computing the national norms. The cell weights, listed in the last two columns of the table for each sex, are the ratios between the number of first-time, full-time

⁴Although each participating institution was provided a complete tabulation of its data, those whose sampling was regarded as unrepresentative were informed that comparisons between their institutional data and the national norms should be made with caution.

freshmen in the eligible population within a given cell and the number of freshmen entering ACE sample institutions in that cell. Because of the expansion of the survey this year, more institutions provided data acceptable for inclusion in the norms; the cell weights are therefore generally smaller than those in prior surveys and fewer cells had to be combined. One fortunate consequence of the smaller cell weights is that the norms are less likely to be influenced by idiosyncrasies in the data from a particular institution.

The cell weights were further adjusted within each institution according to the proportion of the institution's first-time, full-time entering freshmen who completed the questionnaire and who reported their sex on the SIF. Typically, this second weight is close to 1.0; in the case of an institution that administered the form to its entire freshman class, it is exactly 1.0. The final weight applied to the data from each student was the product of this within-institution participation weight and the appropriate cell weight shown in Table 1.5

The purpose of these weighting procedures is to adjust the summary data presented in this report so that it is representative

⁵Note that the cell weight shown in Table l is a sex-specific constant for each ACE sample institution in a given cell, whereas the within-institution weight is a sex-specific constant for a given institution but varies from one institution to another, depending on how adequately the institution "covered" its entering class. Another type of weight (not shown) is the institutional weight. This weight -- defined as the ratio between the number of institutions in the population within a given cell and the number of participating institutions whose data were used in computing the 1971 national norms -- will be utilized in studies where the institution (rather than the student) is the unit of analysis.

of all first-time, full-time students entering institutions of higher education in the fall of 1971. It is important to note that the SIF was completed by <u>entering</u> freshmen and thus the data reflect responses prior to any substantial experience with college life.

The Student Information Form

The Student Information Form is designed to serve two functions: first, to obtain student input data for longitudinal research; and second, to obtain standard descriptive and normative data for general information. Therefore, it contains a number of standard biographical and demographic items that have been administered annually to each entering class. It also contains research-oriented items that are either new (e.g., students were asked for the first time this year whether they felt that they would need special tutoring or remedial work, and if so, in which subjects) or modified from items used in previous years (e.g., expansion and rewording of racial/ethnic categories). The inclusion of both old and new items permits the most thorough coverage of a wide range of student characteristics but also represents a compromise between two dissimilar objectives: comparability of information from year to year and flexibility in item content to meet the changing needs in longitudinal research. Table 2 lists the items in the 1971 Student Information Form and indicates

father's and mother's occupations not included in 1966. Students instead gave "second" and "least appealing" career choices.

their comparability with items used in previous surveys. 6

A copy of the Student Information Form is reproduced in Appendix B. This form -- designed for self-administration under proctored conditions and for processing onto magnetic tape by means of an optical mark reader -- was developed in close collaboration with students, representatives of professional associations, of the participating institutions, and of governmental agencies, educational researchers and administrators.

Each year, four tape files are developed from the Student Information Form: (1) an institutional summary file containing institutional identification numbers and an institutional summary of the responses for men and women; (2) a file containing individual responses and a student identification number, but no names and addresses; (3) a name-and-address file containing a second independent student identification number but no other data; this file is used only in the mailing out of followup questionnaires required for longitudinal research; and (4) a "link" file containing only the two independent identification numbers. This last file is maintained under an elaborate system developed to assure strict confidentiality of data from individual students and to protect against misuse of the name-and-address file (Astin and Boruch, 1970).

⁶Several items (e.g., probable major field of study) have been recoded into a smaller number of categories in the data presented in this norms report. Because such coding schemes cannot satisfy all needs, the original questionnaire responses and the recoding scheme used to report the data are shown in Appendix C.

1971 National Norms

Table 3 shows the numbers of institutions and of students on which the 1971 national norms are based; it also gives an estimate -derived through the weighting procedures -- of the total student population. 7 The 326 institutions included in the national norms are divided into two-year colleges, four-year colleges, and uni-They are then further divided into nine other categories: two-year public colleges, two-year private colleges, technological institutions, four-year public colleges, four-year private nonsectarian colleges, four-year Protestant colleges, four-year Roman Catholic colleges, public universities, and private universities. The first category shown in Table 3 includes all institutions. In addition to these 13 categories, normative data are presented for 11 "supplementary" categories: four geographic regions, 8 six sectarian categories further subdivided by sex and control, and predominantly black institutions. Appendix D indicates the relationship between the sampling design (stratification cell assignment) and the assignment of institutions to norms groups.

The items of normative data appear in the same order in the norms report and in the individual reports furnished to each

⁷These "head counts" of students entering different types of colleges are based in part on reports of total first-time, full-time students in 1971 given by each of our institutional representatives. These reports are then weighted in terms of the procedure described earlier.

⁸The assignment of a state to a given region is based on the same criteria used by the United States Office of Education.

participating institution.⁹ The first 24 pages of the national norms present item data separately for men, women, and all students according to the first 13 categories shown in Table 3; the following 16 pages show norms for the remaining four regional categories and the seven additional categories of institutions.

The different types of institutions can be compared on any given item by examining the percentages in the row following the item. For many items the data differ substantially among categories of institutions. It should be emphasized that there is also considerable variation within any category of institution.

Precision of the Normative Data and Their Comparisons

Although it is impractical to report statistical indicators of the precision of every reported categorical percentage in every norms group, some idea of the confidence that may be placed in the reported data is important in comparing data across the norms groups, across related item categories, and over time (i.e., with data from earlier norms reports). Because of major modifications in the stratification scheme, time trend analyses, based on comparisons of the 1971 normative data with earlier reports in the series, should be made with caution. Changes from earlier years

¹⁰A data processing error has recently been discovered in the 1970 norms. The error was restricted to a single large two-year college with large minority enrollments which received a disproportionately high weight. Comparisons against that year are therefore particularly tenuous. Corrected 1970 norms, which are also based on the new stratification scheme, will be published in the future.

which are an artifact of the revised stratification are particularly marked in regard to head counts within some norms groups, the effect being to now more closely approximate known institutional subpopulation counts. Nevertheless, it appears that the normative data are relatively unchanged by the modifications in the stratification design. The 1971 norms were also calculated on the basis of the stratification scheme employed in 1970, but comparisons of results for the larger aggregates of norms groups indicated no major discrepancies due to the application of the alternate schemes. However, norms for selected years since 1966 and including 1970 will be published by ACE in the future based on the stratification scheme introduced this year, in order that more directly comparable data for time trend analyses will be available.

While reported categorical percentages may be multiplied by the total number of students estimated for a norms group in order to convert the data into frequencies (to be used, for instance, in estimating facility requirements in program planning), both the reported percentages and the estimated number of students in a total group are subject to sampling errors. So far as random errors are concerned, the standard error of a categorical percentage for the total normative sample is about 0.1 percent; it is somewhat larger in the norms groups based on various subpopulations of the domain. For the smallest norms groups, the standard error may be as large as 2 percent. Because the sampling design introduces no explicit control for regional differences among institutions, somewhat less confidence can be placed in the regional norms.

The chief source of error in stratified sampling is the nonrepresentativeness of samples within each stratification cell. Although reasonable precautions are taken to minimize known sources of systematic bias, the reported data are subject to some unknown degree of constant and nonrandom variable errors. The actual magnitude of such errors is probably too small to have any adverse effect on decision making in higher education. Caution is necessary, however, when a participating institution compares its own summary data with the data for the corresponding national norm group, especially when the institution is very small or when it has not surveyed all of its entering freshmen.

In spite of these potential hazards, communications from users indicate that the national norms published in this series are highly useful, and are sufficiently accurate to be used with confidence both in research and in matters of practical concern to higher education. Additional analyses of freshmen and followup data collected through the Cooperative Institutional Research Program will be performed by the American Council on Education, at cost, for any individual or organization requesting such analyses through the ACE data-accessing system (Bayer et al., 1969).
