

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THE AMERICAN FRESHMAN: NATIONAL NORMS FOR FALL 2007

This is the forty-second annual report of national normative data on the characteristics of students attending American colleges and universities as first-time, full-time freshmen. This series, initiated in the Fall of 1966, is a project of the Cooperative Institutional Research Program (CIRP), the longest-running and largest continuing longitudinal study of the American higher education system. CIRP is run by the Higher Education Research Institute (HERI), which is part of the Graduate School of Education & Information Studies at the University of California, Los Angeles. During the past 42 years, the CIRP has generated an array of normative, substantive, and methodological research on a wide range of issues in American higher education.

In the past year, as a part of our celebration of the 40th anniversary of the CIRP, HERI faculty and staff published a variety of monographs examining long-term trends among all college freshmen (Pryor, Hurtado, Sáenz, Santos & Korn, 2007), as well as trends among specific populations such as first-generation students (Sáenz, Hurtado, Barrera, Wolf, & Yeung, 2007) and Asian American students (Chang, Park, Lin, Poon, & Nakanishi, 2007). These last two reports join with the 2005 publication by Allen, Jayakumar, Griffin, Korn, and Hurtado that examines trends among Black

undergraduates. The CIRP Freshman Survey instrument is revised annually to reflect the changing concerns of the academic community and others who use the information.

The data reported in this monograph are weighted to provide a normative profile of the American freshman population for use by individuals engaged in policy analysis, educational research, college administration, human resource planning, and guidance and counseling. The data are also useful to the general community of current and future college students, their parents, and college faculty.

A major purpose of the CIRP is to provide initial information for longitudinal research. HERI conducts two follow-up surveys that enable institutions to examine changes amongst their students: the Your First College Year Survey (YFCY) which surveys students at the end of the first year of college, and the College Senior Survey (CSS), which surveys students during their last year of college. Longitudinal follow-up studies of CIRP students have been used in major studies of science students (Hurtado, Han, Sáenz, Espinosa, Cabrera & Cerna, 2007; Chang, Cerna, Han & Sáenz, in press), retention (Astin & Oseguera, 2002), community service and citizenship (Sax, 2004; Vogelgesang & Astin, 2000), first-year adjustment (Hurtado et al., 2007, Keup & Stolzenberg,

2004); and diversity in higher education (Cole, 2007; Hurtado, 2006; Chang, Denson, Sáenz & Misa, 2006; Gurin, Dey, Hurtado & Gurin, 2002).

The normative data presented here are reported separately for men and women, and for 26 different institutional groupings. The major stratifying factors are institutional race

(predominantly black, predominantly white), control (public, private non-sectarian, Roman Catholic, other religious), type (university, four-year college) and "selectivity level" of the institution. A complete discussion of the CIRP survey methodology, stratification scheme, and weighting procedures is presented in Appendix A.

AN OVERVIEW OF THE 2007 FRESHMAN NORMS

The 2007 freshman norms are based on the weighted responses of 272,036 first-time full-time students at 356 of the nation's baccalaureate colleges and universities. These data have been statistically adjusted to reflect the responses of the 1.4 million first-time, full-time students entering four-year colleges and universities as freshmen in 2007.

The Cooperative Institutional Research Program (CIRP) Freshman Survey was first administered nationally in 1966. It is the longest-running project of its kind, covering 42 years and containing data from over 13 million students. Over the years, more than 1,700 colleges and universities have participated in the CIRP Freshman Survey, using their own institutional data both to more accurately understand the characteristics of their incoming students and to use as a baseline in future studies examining institutional effectiveness.

"Habits of Mind" for Learning

College faculty have identified particular habits of mind that students bring to the learning enterprise that include behaviors and traits that ensure success in introductory coursework (Conley, 2005), and more importantly, serve as an important foundation for lifelong learning (AAC&U, 2007). In Fall 2007, we introduced a set of items to capture some of these essential habits and behaviors among incoming freshmen, allowing campuses to monitor changes in essential learning behaviors after the first year of college and in the senior year of college using CIRP surveys. Table 1 shows how frequently freshmen engaged in particular behaviors for learning.

Most freshmen report that they frequently support their opinions with a logical argument (58.2 percent), more than half state they frequently ask questions in class (54.4 percent),

and almost half that they seek solutions to problems and explain them to others (49.4 percent). In terms of other habits, 46.8 percent state that they frequently revise their papers to improve their writing, seek feedback on their academic work (43.9 percent), and seek alternative solutions to a problem (41.6 percent). Women are substantially more likely than men to frequently revise their papers to improve their writing (54.9 percent vs. 36.9 percent) and to seek feedback on their work (49.0 percent vs. 37.6 percent). We will monitor whether these habits become more prevalent or decline over the first year of college with the CIRP Your First College Year Survey as well as when these students graduate from college with the CIRP College Senior Survey.

Of particular concern is that only slightly over a third of students (35.0 percent) report that they frequently evaluate the quality or reliability of information they receive, and only 29.0 percent report that they frequently explore topics on their own even though it was not required for class. Students are least likely to frequently look up scientific research arti-

cles and resources (21.2 percent). These behaviors have not become regular habits of mind among the majority of incoming college freshmen, despite the fact that faculty have come to expect that students learn to evaluate knowledge claims as an essential part of liberal education and intellectual development. The lack of motivation for such an evaluation may indicate a preference for information that is more easily attainable (such as on the Internet) rather than information that is accurate.

Indeed, information-seeking involves the Internet on a daily basis with today's college students, with approximately three quarters of freshmen (75.9 percent) indicating that in the past year they used the Internet frequently for research or homework, 44.0 percent to read news sites, and 34.2 percent to read blogs. Table 2 shows the proportion of freshmen who stated how frequently they evaluated the quality and reliability of the information they received by frequent uses of the Internet. Students who are frequent Internet users engage in some evaluation of the quality or reliability of

information they receive, but the majority are not in the frequent habit of doing so.

General education programs (introductory courses in college in particular) must continue to address information literacy and general habits of mind associated with learning and the success of all students. Table 3 indicates large variability in specific habits of mind across students entering college by quartiles of freshmen SAT/ACT conversion scores (top 25 percent, middle 50 percent, and lowest 25 percent). There are large differences in many of these habits by student test scores. The striking differences are evident when comparing how many students in the top and bottom quartiles support opinions with a logical argument frequently (78.0 vs 45.4 percent), seek solutions to problems and explain them to others (67.0 vs 39.2 percent), and evaluate the quality or reliability of information they received (49.6 vs 27.0 percent, respectively). These high scorers are empowered learners who have achieved some mastery of knowledge, while those scoring lowest are perhaps less likely to engage in these behaviors. Differences are also evident in typical classroom-related behaviors that may improve student success, including asking questions in class, revising papers to improve writing, exploring topics on their own, and looking up scientific research articles. Students differ the least on the item about taking a risk because they felt they had more to gain, but students of different ability levels may be taking different kinds of risks. It is important to note how few of even the highest scoring students (28.9 percent) frequently look up scientific research or resources. Further research will determine the characteristics of students who frequently engaged in these habits of mind in high school and subsequently in college.

Parental Involvement

How involved parents are in the college careers of their sons or daughters can have an impact on the experiences of not only the college-bound student, but also college officials and faculty as well. In recent years, some college faculty and administrators have reported that parents have become more involved in the college-related decisions of their children. One possible result of such increased involvement might be that students whose parents intervene more often are less likely to develop their own problem-solving skills. They might also be less likely to make developmental gains if their parents are inserting themselves into potential learning experiences. To examine these issues, we included a new section on the survey with six parental involvement questions that ranged from the college application process to choosing college courses and activities. Students could report if their parents were involved "too much," the "right amount," or "too little."

Most students, across all types of involvement, report that their parents were involved the "right amount." In the decision to go to college, 84.0 percent of students report that their parents were involved the "right amount," and 80.5 percent indicate that parents were involved the "right amount" in their decision to attend the college at which they matriculated. Almost three-quarters (74.2 percent) report that parents were involved the "right amount" in their applications to college. Once enrolled, approximately three-quarters were involved the "right amount" in choosing courses (72.5 percent), choosing activities (73.7 percent) and dealings with college officials (77.5 percent).



Contrary to popular perceptions of college "helicopter parents," perhaps the most interesting finding concerning parental involvement is that significant percentages of students report that their parents had been involved "too little" in some college decisions. Close to 1 in 4, or 24.0 percent, of incoming college students report that parental involvement was "too little" in choosing college courses, and 22.5 percent in choosing college activities. A smaller group, 16.7 percent, report "too little" involvement in dealing with college officials. Even fewer students thought that their parents had been involved "too little" with college admissions issues such as deciding to go to college (5.7 percent) and helping with applications (15.1 percent). It appears, then, that students are more likely to report "too little" parental involvement in activities that take place after admission to college than before or during the admissions and decision-making process.

There are, however, some significant differences in involvement when comparing students of different racial backgrounds. As illustrated in Table 4, White students were less likely than students of other racial/ethnic backgrounds to report "too little" parental involvement, and in many cases, Latina/Latino students were the most likely to report "too little" parental involvement. This may be due to the fact that this population has historically had the largest proportion of first generation college students. The mechanics of getting in and getting through are less familiar for these parents, although support to go to college has risen over the years. A trend report on Latino entering freshmen will be available in 2008.

The Impact of Online Social Networking Sites

Over the past few years, social networking websites such as Facebook and MySpace have become a common way for students to communicate with one another. This year we introduced a question about students' use of social networking sites that explores how often students used such sites during their senior year of high school. This question was in the "time

diary" section of the survey, and asked students how much time they typically spent each week on online social networking sites such as MySpace and Facebook.

Overall, 86.3 percent of entering freshmen report that during their last year of high school they spent at least some time on social networking sites each week, and 18.9 percent report that they spent six or more hours a week on such sites. About half (49.3 percent) report that they were typically on social networking sites for one to five hours per week.

Compared to other common activities (Figure 2), the amount of time that entering freshmen report spending on social networking sites is less than the amount of time they report engaging in academic pursuits, employment, and "live" socializing. Students report spending the most time each week socializing with

friends, working for pay, engaging in exercise or sports, and doing homework or studying— 33.8 to 73.4 percent report spending six or more hours on these activities each week. Students report spending the least amount of time each week playing video or computer games, reading for pleasure, and performing volunteer work (10.1 to 11.3 percent indicate spending six or more hours a week on these activities). Falling in the middle of all activities, the time that entering freshmen report spending on social networking is most comparable to the time that they report spending partying, participating in student clubs or groups, and watching TV; 14.8 to 25.8 percent of freshmen report that these activities took up six or more hours in a typical week.

Table 5 shows differences by race/ethnicity and gender in use of social networking sites.



Females used social networking sites more often as high school seniors than males, with 72.0 percent reporting spending one or more hours on social networking sites during a typical week in high school compared to 63.4 percent of males. This gender difference narrows as we look at larger increments of time, with 20.0 percent of females spending six or more hours on social networking sites each week compared to 17.5 percent of males.

Students from different racial/ethnic backgrounds also indicate that they used social networking sites at different levels. Specifically, African American and Asian American students are most likely to report that they spent a significant amount of time on social network sites in high school. Almost three in ten African American freshmen (27.7 percent), and just over two in ten Asian American freshmen (22.4 percent) indicate that they spent six or more hours in a typical week on social networking sites. Hispanic students are the least likely of all groups to report spending any time on social networking sites—33.4 percent indicate spending less than one hour on networking sites each week, and only 20.2 percent report spending six or more hours on them.

Interestingly, students who spent more time per week on online social network sites did not seem to spend less time on any other activity—at least, not on any other activity asked about on the CIRP Freshman Survey (Table 6). First-year students who report spending more time than their peers on social networking sites in high school tended to spend the same amount of time studying or doing homework, and more time on a variety of leisure activities, including social activities such as partying, socializing with friends, and student clubs/ groups, as well as private activities such as reading for pleasure, playing video/computer games, and watching TV. Similarly, students who report using social networking sites more heavily in high school do not report that they

used the Internet more often than their peers for research or homework purposes, but do report using it more often for leisure purposes such as reading news sites and blogs.

Finally, along the same lines, first-year students who report more online social networking use in high school also report drinking alcohol more often than those who did not use social networking sites as often. The biggest difference in rates of drinking is between students who report using social networking sites for less than an hour a week (approximately 30 to 40 percent report drinking wine/liquor and/or beer frequently and occasionally) and those who report using them for one or more hours (approximately 40 to 50 percent report drinking wine, liquor or beer frequently or oc-

casionally). These results suggest that students who are most active and most social in their daily lives (outside of school) are the students who are most likely to use social networking sites—perhaps as a natural outgrowth of the activities in which they already partake.

Despite the fact that students who spent more time on social networking sites do not report spending less time on studying/homework than their peers, there is some evidence that those who were on social networking sites more often may not have been as assiduous in their high-school studies as were their peers. The differences are slight, but more students who report spending six or more hours per week on online social networks, compared to those who spent less time, indicate that they

had special tutoring or remedial work in high school (24.0 percent vs. 18.6–20.2 percent). More also indicate that they feel they will need special tutoring or remedial work in college (43.0 percent vs. 36.0–36.5 percent).

Issues of Diversity


Attitudes about diversity continue to change amongst incoming first-year students. We see a continuing increase in the personal goal to help promote racial understanding, which at 36.7 percent in 2007 shows an increase of 2.7 percentage points over 2006 and is the highest this figure has been since 1994. This percentage is, as one might expect, much higher for those students at Black colleges and universities, where 64.0 percent hold this as an essential or very important personal goal.

We have also seen steady increases in students' personal goal of improving their understanding of other countries and cultures from 43.2 percent in 2002 (when this item was first placed on the questionnaire after 9/11 events) to 52.3 percent in 2007. Women were slightly more likely than men to indicate having each of these cross-cultural goals (5 and 8 percentage points, respectively).

One of the largest gender gaps is evident on the issue of whether same-sex couples should have the right to legal marital status, with 55.3 percent of men and 70.3 percent of women in agreement. Somewhat lower levels of support are evident among men at Black colleges (40.9 percent) and women at Black colleges (53.8 percent). However, the general trend in the past ten years among entering freshmen has been of steadily increasing support (from 50.9 percent in 1997 to 63.5 percent in 2007) for legal marital status for same sex couples. Other gender differences are evident on key issues. More than half of all men (53.7 percent) were likely to agree with the statement that undocumented immigrants should be denied access to public education, compared with only 43.5 percent of all women, 43.3 percent of men and 39.2 percent of women at Black colleges who agreed. It seems a broader coalition of agreement among all women and Black men is possible on perhaps this issue. A similar pattern was evident on the statement that affirmative action in college admissions should be abolished, with more than half of all men in agreement (53.2 percent). Significantly, fewer women at all colleges (43.3 percent), and even fewer men and women at Black colleges were in agreement about abolishing affirmative action (31.3 percent and 27.4 percent, respectively).

Environmental Concerns

In a year when being "green" has become increasingly more high profile, and more colleges and universities are engaged in sustainability projects, incoming first-year students are showing a return to an increased concern for the environment. In our section on important values and beliefs, we see a twenty percent



increase in the proportion of students who believe it is essential or very important to be "involved in programs to clean up the environment," moving from 22.2 percent in 2006 to 26.7 percent in 2007. This marks a return to levels of concern not seen in over a decade, as reflected in Figure 3. A corresponding increase is seen in how many incoming freshmen believe that the "federal government is not doing enough to control environmental pollution," moving almost three percentage points (approximately 37,800 students nationally) from 77.1 percent in 2005 to 79.8 percent in 2007.

Reasons for Choosing a Particular College

Since 1972 the CIRP Freshman Survey has examined the aspects students feel are important when choosing which college they are attending. Since that time 35 years ago, the reason consistently given as "very important"

by the most students has been "this college has a very good academic reputation." This year academic quality not only continued as the top reason, but it increased 5.6 percentage points from 2006 up to 63.0 percent, and is the highest it has been in 35 years. Rising along with academic reputation is "graduates get good jobs," rising 2.6 percentage points to 51.9 percent (also a 35-year high) and "graduates get admission to top graduate/professional schools," rising 3.9 percentage points to 34.1 percent. These data indicate that incoming college students might be reacting to the national debates on measuring the quality of college education and accountability by weighting related factors more heavily in their admissions decisions. If they are, national rankings are not playing a large role in their thoughts. While the importance of rankings in national magazines increased by 1.3 percentage points in 2007, it is still the case that only a very small

percentage (17.6 percent) of college freshmen report that the rankings are "very important" in their decision.

Affordability plays an even more important role in the decision-making process than it has in the past. The importance of being awarded financial assistance leaps up 5.1 percentage points from 2006 to 39.4 percent, the highest this figure has been in 35 years. More students also rate the "cost of attending this college" as a "very important" factor in 2007, with this figure rising 4.6 percentage points to 36.8 percent.

Finally, lest one think that all that students have on their minds is accountability and affordability, more students also believe that a reputation for good social activities is important. The importance of social activities rises 4.9 percentage points to 37.1 percent in 2007, the highest it has been in 35 years as well. It is encouraging, however, that almost all (88.9%) of the students reporting that social activities are "very important" also report that academic reputation is very important.

# Appendix A Research Methodology

#### DEVELOPING THE NATIONAL NORMS

The data reported here have been weighted to provide a normative picture of the American college freshman population for persons engaged in policy analysis, human resource planning, campus administration, educational research, and guidance and counseling, as well as for the general community of students and parents. This Appendix provides a brief overview of the CIRP methodology and describes the procedures used to weight the annual freshman survey results to produce the national normative estimates.


#### HISTORICAL OVERVIEW

From 1966 to 1970, approximately 15 percent of the nation's institutions of higher education were selected by sampling procedures and invited to participate in the program. As the academic community became aware of the value of program participation, additional institutions asked to participate. Beginning in 1971, all institutions that have entering freshman classes and that respond to the U.S. Department of Education's (DOE) Higher Education General Information Survey were invited to participate (see 'The National Population' below). A minimal charge plus a unit rate based on the number of forms processed helps to defray the direct costs of the survey. In Fall 1974 and 1975, samples of proprietary institutions also participated in the survey.

#### THE NATIONAL POPULATION FOR 2007

For the purposes of the 2007 CIRP, the population has been defined as all institutions of higher education admitting first time freshmen and granting a baccalaureate-level degree or higher listed in the Opening Fall Enrollment (OFE) files of the U.S. Department of Education's Higher Education General Information Survey (HEGIS, since 1986 known as IPEDS—Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System). An institution is considered eligible if it was operating at the time of the HEGIS/IPEDS survey and had a first-time full-time (FTFT) freshman class of at least 25 students. In addition, a small number of institutions or their branches are included even though their separate enrollments were not available from the OFE files, because they were part of prior HEGIS/IPEDS populations and are known to be functioning with FTFT students. The 2007 population figures were obtained from the on-line OFE Survey for Fall, 2006. In 2007, the national population included 1,571 institutions.

Selectivity (SEL), used to define strata for four-year colleges and universities, is an estimate of the mean score of entering freshmen on the Verbal plus Mathematical portions of the Scholastic Aptitude Test (or the converted SAT Math and Verbal equivalents from the American College Test composite). The method of estimation is described in detail in Astin and Henson (1977).

The stratification design presented here is used to group schools to develop population weights and should not be used as a measure of institutional or program quality.

It should be noted that the population reflects institutions of "higher education," rather than "postsecondary education." Most proprietary, special vocational or semiprofessional institutions are not included in the population. Beginning with the Fall 1993 survey, only institutions with regional accreditation (including provisional accreditation) were included.

#### INSTITUTIONAL STRATIFICATION DESIGN

The institutions identified as part of the national population are divided into 26 stratification groups based on institutional race (predominantly non-black vs. predominantly black), type (four-year college, university¹), control (public, private nonsectarian, Roman Catholic and other religious²) and the "selectivity level" of the institution. Selectivity, defined as the average composite SAT score of the entering class, was made an integral part of the stratification design in 1968. The selectivity figures were revised and updated in 1975, and again in 2001. Figure A1 shows the distribution of institutions across the 26 stratification cells.

It should be noted that the dividing lines between low, medium and high selectivity levels are different for different types of institutions, as shown in the table below.

Changes in stratification assignment do occur; institutional requests for review are honored each year. Appendix D lists the current stratification cell assignment of all institutions participating in the 2007 CIRP Freshman Survey.

Having defined the population in terms of the stratification cell scheme, the OFE file is used to compute the male and female FTFT population in each cell. These population counts form the target counts of the weighting procedure.

¹ For stratification purposes, we define a "university" as an institution that awards a certain minimal number of earned doctoral degrees. Institutions that offer postbaccalaureate programs but do not award a sufficient number of doctoral degrees are considered four-year colleges. The stratification design presented here is used to group schools to develop population weights and should not be used as a measure of institutional or program quality.

² This type of institution was labeled "Protestant" in publications prior to 2000. "Other Religious" more correctly characterizes the institutions that have always been in this group, which include all institutions affiliated with a religion other than Roman Catholic.

#### **IDENTIFYING THE NORMS SAMPLE**

Generally speaking, an institution is included in the National Norms sample if it provided a representative sample of its FTFT population. The minimum percentage required of a sample is based on the type of institution from which it was collected. For four-year colleges the minimum is 85 percent, while for universities, the minimum is 75 percent. Institutions whose sample proportions were less than but close to these cutoffs are included if the method used to administer the survey showed no systematic biases in freshman class coverage.

Information about the FTFT population and the method of survey administration is obtained from participating institutions at the time they return their completed surveys. In the event an institution did not return FTFT information, counts from the most recent OFE survey are used. This procedure, although not optimal, is adequate unless the institution experienced a substantial change in its FTFT population since the last HEGIS/IPEDS survey.

#### THE 2007 DATA

Although 374,261 respondents at 536 colleges and universities³ returned their forms in time for their data to be included in the 2007 norms, the normative data presented here are based on responses from 272,036 FTFT freshmen entering 356 baccalaureate institutions.

The normative data presented here were collected by administering the 2007 CIRP Freshman Survey during registration, freshman orientation, or the first few weeks of classes (i.e., before the students have had any substantial experience with college life). The survey is designed to elicit a wide range of biographic and demographic data, as well as data on the student's high school background, career plans, educational aspirations, financial arrangements, high school activities, and current attitudes. In addition to standard biographic and demographic items that have been administered annually to each entering class, the survey also contains other research-oriented items that may have been modified from previous years (e.g., see the list of attitudinal questions listed under item #34, Appendix B). The inclusion of modified items permits a more thorough coverage of student characteristics but also represents a compromise between two mutually exclusive objectives: (1) comparability of information from year to year which is required for assessing trends; and (2) flexibility in item content to meet changing information and research needs. Table A1 lists the 2007 CIRP Freshman Survey items and indicates previous survey years in which comparable items have been used.

The CIRP Freshman Survey, reproduced as Appendix B, has been developed in collaboration with students, professional associations, participating institutions, government agencies, educational researchers, administrators, policy makers, and members of the CIRP Advisory Committee. It is designed for self-administration under proctored conditions and for processing into electronic form with a mark reflex reader. The CIRP Freshman Survey content is reviewed annually by the CIRP project staff, with the assistance of the CIRP Advisory Committee as well as others interested in the annual freshman survey program.

Four data files are developed from the CIRP Freshman Survey each year: (1) an institutional summary file containing institutional identification numbers and an institutional summary of the responses for men and women; (2) a file containing individual responses and a student identification number, but no names and addresses; (3) a name-and-address file containing a second, independent student identification number; and (4) a "link" file containing *only* the two independent identification numbers. This last file is maintained under an elaborate system developed to ensure strict confidentiality of individual student data and to protect against misuse of the name-and-address file (Astin & Boruch, 1970).

Those data from institutions meeting minimal quality requirements for inclusion in the 2007 norms (above) were differentially weighted to represent the population of entering freshmen at all higher educational institutions in the United States (see 'Weighting the Sample' below). Part-time students and those who are not first-time college students (i.e., transfers and former enrollees) were excluded from the normative sample. Since the 1972 survey, special care has been taken to define these enrollment statuses; in surveys before 1972, the participating institutions were asked to exclude part-time students, while non-first-time students were excluded during the data processing stage by screening out those who indicated that they had previously attended college. Since that time, all students who did not identify themselves as part-time were included in the national norms if they either graduated from high school in the year of the survey or had never attended any post-secondary institution.

#### WEIGHTING THE SAMPLE

Those institutions identified as being part of the Norms sample are weighted by a two-step procedure. The first weight is designed to adjust for nonparticipation <u>within</u> institutions. Counts of the male and female FTFT population for each institution are divided by that institution's male and female FTFT respondent count. The resulting weights, when applied to each respondent, bring the male and female respondent counts up to the corresponding counts for the population at that institution.

The second weight is designed to compensate for nonparticipating institutions within each stratification cell. The weighted male and female counts for all participating institutions in each stratification cell are first summed, and then are divided into the national male and female FTFT counts for all institutions in that stratification cell, producing a second set of ("cell") weights. (The last two columns of Table A2 show the final weights that were applied to the 2007 data.) The final weight is simply the product of the first and second weights.

Weighting each respondent using this final weight brings the male and female counts for each stratification cell up to the corresponding national counts for all institutions in that stratification cell.

#### **COMPARISON GROUPS**

Weighted data are combined separately to form various comparison (or Norms) groups. Most norms groups are hierarchically organized, allowing participating institutions to compare their results at different levels of specificity. A college assigned to stratification cell #14, for example, can compare its results with the following five Norms groups (in declining order of specificity):

Private nonsectarian four-year colleges, very high selectivity
All private nonsectarian four-year colleges
All private four-year colleges
All four-year colleges
All baccalaureate institutions

Table A3 shows the 2007 distribution of schools and respondents across the 32 Norms groups printed in the annual *American Freshman* report, as well as a summary of distribution by national region. The weighted results reported here represent the "all baccalaureate institutions" group—the overall weighted summary based on all 272,036 respondents whose institutions were included in the national norms.

### Appendix E

### The Precision of the Normative Data and Their Comparisons

A common question asked about sample surveys relates to the precision of the data, which is typically reported as the accuracy of a percentage "plus or minus x percentage points." This figure, which is known as a confidence interval, can be estimated for items of interest if one knows the response percentage and its standard error.

Given the CIRP's large normative sample, the calculated standard error associated with any particular response percentage will be small (as will its confidence interval). It is important to note, however, that traditional methods of calculating standard error assume conditions which, (as is the case with most real sample survey data), do not apply here. Moreover, there are other possible sources of error which should be considered in comparing data across normative groups, across related item categories, and over time. In reference to the precision of the CIRP data, these concerns include:

- 1) Traditional methods of calculating standard error assume that the <u>individuals</u> were selected through simple random sampling. Given the complex stratified design of the CIRP, where whole <u>institutions</u> participate, it is likely that the actual standard errors will be somewhat larger than the standard error estimates produced through traditional computational methods. In addition, while every effort has been made to maximize the comparability of the institutional sample from year to year (repeat participation runs about 90 percent), comparability is reduced by non-repeat participation and year-to-year variation in the quality of data collected by continuing institutional participants. While the CIRP stratification and weighting procedures are designed to minimize this institutional form of "response bias," an unknown amount of non-random variation is introduced into the results.
- 2) The wording of some questions in the survey instrument, the text and number of response options, and their order of presentation have changed over the years. We have found that even small changes can produce large order and context effects. Given this, the *exact* wording and order of items on the survey instrument (which is produced as Appendix B) should be examined carefully prior to making comparisons across survey years.
- 3) Substantial changes in the institutional stratification scheme were made in 1968, 1971, 1975 and 2000. These changes resulted in a revision of the weights applied to individual institutions between 1966 and 2007. Stratification cell assignments of a few institutions may also change from time to time, but the scale of these changes and their effect on the national normative results are likely to be small in comparison to other sources of bias.

Since it is impractical to report statistical indicators for every percentage in every CIRP norms group, it is important for those who are interested to be able to estimate the precision of the data. Toward this end, Table E1 provides estimates of standard errors for norms groups of various sizes and for different percentages¹ which can be used to derive confidence interval estimates.

For example, suppose the item we are interested in has a response percentage of 18.7 percent among students at all nonsectarian four-year colleges (a normative group that is about 41,000 in size). First, we choose the <u>column</u> that is closest to the observed percentage 18.7—in this case "20%." Next, we select the <u>row</u> closest to the unweighted sample size of 41,000—in this case "50,000." With a sample size of about 50,000 and a percentage that is close to 20, the estimated standard error would be .179.

To calculate the confidence interval at the 95% probability level, we multiply the estimated standard error by the critical value of t for the unweighted sample size (which, for all CIRP norms groups, will be equal to 1.96 at the .05 level of probability).³ In this example, we would multiply the estimated standard error of .179 by 1.96, which yields .350. If we round this figure to a single decimal point we would then estimate our confidence interval to be  $18.7 \pm .4$ . In practical terms, this confidence interval means that if we were to replicate this survey using the same size sample, we would expect that the resulting percentage would fall between 18.3 percent and 19.1 percent 95 times out of 100.

# Appendix F Sample Report Furnished to Campuses Participating in the 2007 CIRP Freshman Survey

### NOTES ON THE SAMPLE REPORT

The Standard Institutional Profile Report divides students into three basic groups, depending on how they answer question numbers 4, 5, 10, and 11 on the survey (see Appendix B). These groups are:

**FIRST-TIME FULL-TIME.** Students enrolled full-time who either graduated from high school in the same year as entering college *or* who have had no previous college experience.

**FIRST-TIME PART-TIME.** Students enrolled part-time who either graduated from high school in the same year as entering college *or* who have had no previous college experience.

**NOT FIRST-TIME.** Full- or part-time students who have had some college experience since graduating from high school.

The first section of a standard Institutional Profile Report (entitled "Total First-Time Full-Time") includes FIRST-TIME FULL-TIME students *only*. The first three columns summarize the results by gender for students attending the institution. The remaining six columns summarize results by gender for students in two comparison groups of increasing breadth (in the case of the sample, these are "nonsectarian four-year colleges of high selectivity" and "all nonsectarian four-year colleges").

The second section of the Report (entitled "Standard Breakouts", not included in this Appendix) includes results by gender for the FIRST-TIME PART-TIME and NOT FIRST-TIME (labelled "Transfer" on the report) groups, as well as results for all three groups combined. There are no comparative results displayed on this report, as the Higher Education Research Institute does not compute National Normative figures for FIRST-TIME PART-TIME or NOT-FIRST TIME students.

# Beyond Myths: The Growth and Diversity of Asian American College Freshmen: 1971–2005

The first-year student trends examined in this report help to address some common characterizations of Asian American students, particularly with respect to their educational success, that are often overstated and taken out of context. The examined trends do not support popular claims that Asian Americans are enjoying unprecedented, collective (or universal) academic success in U.S. higher education. The findings here suggest that Asian Americans still have to overcome a number of obstacles, such as levels of family income and financial aid, to earn a coveted spot in higher education. This report features data collected from the Cooperative Institutional Research Program's (CIRP) Freshman Survey. It is based on the 361,271 Asian/Asian American first-time full-time college students from 1971-2005, representing the largest compilation and analysis of data on Asian American college students ever undertaken.

#### First in My Family: A Profile of First-Generation College Students at Four-Year Institutions Since 1971
